# When we Don't Know What we Don't Know

he Christmas 2019 newsletter began: "The Christian faith is a singing faith. Whether the Psalms, or hymns, or spiritual songs that fill our services of worship, or that encourage us and give words to our worship and thoughts of God throughout each week and day, can you imagine how impoverished we would be without our songs?"

At that time, we had <u>no idea how 2020</u> would be experienced. We certainly did

not anticipate anything like it has been! Perhaps, at times you have lost your desire to sing? When God's people were in a time of exile, this is how they responded to their captor's demand: "Sing us one of the songs of Zion!" They asked, "How shall we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?" (Psalm 137:3-4)

We have not been in a different location, but it surely has felt like a "foreign land" for most of this year. Ultimately, it is not location or circumstances that are

behind the songs of faith. If it were, then we would not be singing. As Christians, however, we do sing. Dare I say, we must sing! God is worthy of all our worship, praise, adoration and obedience. When times are fair and we are full of hope, and when times are uncertain.

As we conclude 2020 (without further "ado" we pray) we pray that the election tabulations will finally be completed, and verified in a nonpartisan manner, so that all Americans can move forward. Both sides have fueled doubts about the process for months. While most eyes are on the Presidential election, there are also other races being contested from both sides because the count did not go as they wanted. If the politicians are so questioning about the results, from both sides of the aisle, it is not surprising that the general public has concerns as well.

My hope and prayer in last month's article was: "Hopefully the results will not be convoluted. And we pray that all Americans will graciously accept the results and work toward restoring unity and trust. There is much work to be done on those accounts. We have little reason to believe that politicians will be a great part of that work."

But we must. By prayer and fasting. Regarding leaders: "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions and thanksgiving be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way." (1 Tim. 2:1-2)

We do also pray to the God of all grace, the Great Physician of soul and body, for deliverance from the Covid-19 pandemic. We pray for full healing for those afflicted. We pray for safe and effective medical resources. We pray that God will overturn this calamity which has affected most of the world. And we pray most of all that God will overturn the calamity of hardened, rebellious human hearts, that want to be God rather than worship and serve the only true and living God, through His Son Jesus Christ.

As John heard and recorded, while in exile on the island of Patmos: "Hallelujah! For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns. Let us rejoice and exult and give Him the glory..." (Rev. 19:6). Written while in exile. Up-to-the-minute relevance for Christians today. As we near the celebration of the birth of our Savior Jesus Christ, ask the Lord to put a song in your heart, and on your lips, each day. And "pray without ceasing."

## A Surprise in the Night

ast night as I was getting ready for bed, I decided I needed a sip of water. As I reached for my glass, I suddenly saw two little eyes peering over the top of the rim. I jumped back recognizing that another little tree frog had invaded our bedroom. My husband came to my rescue capturing the little guy and returning him to his natural habitat outside. Seems like we have been getting quite a few visitors in our home of late mostly because it has been rainy and also because when we let the dog outside, it gives these critters a chance to hop on in. I don't mind these little bug

eaters but I don't wish to share my water with them or my bedroom for that matter.

As I thought about this surprising and unexpected encounter, my mind went to the miraculous events that preceded the birth of our Savior. If a frog scared me momentarily, think how the Virgin Mary felt when visited by an angel. She was alone when suddenly the heavenly messenger appeared to her (Luke 1:26-38) announcing that she would conceive a Son and call His name Jesus. He would be the Savior of the world. This amazing news was also a lot for this betrothed young woman to take in to

her heart, and she could not understand how this would happen. When the angel finished his announcement, Mary was humbled to serve as a handmaid of the Lord, and spent time praising God after the messenger had gone. Not only was this meeting out of the ordinary, but Mary would also be with child outside of her formal marriage bonds. This would be a frightening prospect for any young woman of that day. Yet, she trusted herself to God's plan.

At some point, Joseph her betrothed husband found out about Mary's condition and decided to end their plans for marriage by quietly divorcing Mary so she would not come to shame. However, God, once again, sent an angel to Joseph in a dream telling Joseph to take Mary as his wife for the child she carried was the long awaited Messiah (Mathew 1:18-26). Once again, a miraculous event took place that brought about fulfillment of God's plan, but this is not the end of the visitations.

Shepherds in the hills around Bethlehem were startled by an angel proclaiming glory to God and announcing the arrival of Messiah (Luke 2:8-14). From beginning to end, God's news came in a surprising way emphasizing the greatest event in all of history. As we celebrate this season let us think on these things...that Christ came as God promised. He lived among us teaching, doing signs and wonders to prove His divinity, and then, He willingly gave up His life in our place for our sins. Finally, Christ rose again assuring us a victory over death and life eternal by believing in Him. We must not let our busy schedules ever obscure the wonder of this birth. ## Songs of the Seasons By Joshua Klatt

(We are taking a short break from our current series to highlight the music of Christmas)

erhaps no other season of the year is so saturated with music as the season of Advent and Christmas. The hymns and carols form a rich tapestry of sound that surrounds and envelopes our celebrations and traditions like a warm, comforting blanket on a snowy day. Indeed, it can be difficult to imagine what the Christmas celebration would be without the familiar carols or the sounds of Handel's *Messiah*. It is the one time of year when even the stores can be caught playing "religious music" on their loudspeakers.

The first songs of Christmas were written hundreds of years before Christ was ever born. The writer of Hebrews makes this clear in the first chapter of his book when he applies verses from Psalm 2 in the context of Christ's the incarnation: "For to which of the angels did God

ever say, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten You'?" (Hebrews 1:5). While not speaking directly of Christ's incarnation, other Messianic Psalms speak of Christ's reign upon the earth, His compassion for the poor, and His coming to judge the peoples in righteousness. This is particularly evident in the three sections of Psalm 72 and Psalter #180 in our *ARP Psalter*. Other Messianic Psalms with an Advent or Christmas emphasis include Psalm 45A, Psalms 89A and D, the Psalms of the Lord's Coming (95-98), and Psalm 110.

The Gospel of Luke also makes it abundantly clear that the first Christmas was accompanied by an outpouring of music and song. Four songs are recorded within the first chapters of this book, the only New Testament song texts outside the book of Revelation: the Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-55), the Song of Zechariah (Luke 1:68-79), the Song of the Angels (Luke 2:14), and the Song of Simeon (Luke 2:29-32). The beloved

Christmas hymn, "While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks" is derived from the third of these sections, and is a metrical setting of Luke 2:8-14 along similar lines to some of the older Psalm versifications.


The celebration of Christmas and Advent continued to be an event of great importance in the life of the early and medieval church. The churches continued to sing the four songs recorded in Luke's Gospel and incorporated the singing of Psalms 98 and 110 into each of the three services for Christmas Day. In addition to this, two hymns were written for Advent which have become standards in most hymnals today: "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" and "Of the Father's Love Begotten." Both of these retain their flowing, Gregorian melodies, infusing their texts with an aura of mystery, reverence, and great antiquity. A third text from the Greek tradition, "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence," has also come to be associated with this time of year, as have two medieval German carols: "Good Christian Men, Rejoice" and "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming."

The Reformation brought sweeping changes in the observance of Christmas all over Europe. The Lutheran Reformers translated many of the older Latin hymns into the vernacular and added a number of the folk carols that expressed a vibrant, Biblical spirituality to their hymnals. They also composed new hymns based on the Scriptures. In time, this pattern was adopted in England, and became the source of the most of the familiar carols we sing today. Isaac Watts adapted the time-honored

text of Psalm 98 to become "Joy to the World" in 1719, and Charles Wesley penned "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" in 1739. Collections of traditional carols from the past added "The First Noel" and "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen." The Scriptural teaching of God's saving grace and peace offered through Christ inspired many in the generations of writers that followed, particularly in the first half of the 19th century. This period gave us "Silent Night," "Angels from the Realms of Glory," and "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Finally, with the completion of "Away in a Manger" in 1892, the canon of Christmas hymns and carols was essentially as we know it today.

Seen in their full context, the carols of Christmas span more nearly three thousand years from the Psalms of David to more recent texts like "Rose of Bethlehem," "How Many Kings?", and "Mary, Did You Know?" However, there are at least two commonalities that unite most of them together: a close adherence to the Scripture and a clear presentation of the good news that Christ has come to save sinners. This is especially evident in the older hymns characterized by paraphrased Scripture passages and clear-cut doctrinal focus. It is, after all, the crux of the Christmas message: "You shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). I hope that these carols will take on new and special meaning for all of us as we celebrate our Lord's first Advent and wonder again in the greatness of God's gift "freely offered to us in the gospel" (Westminster Shorter Catechism, Q. 31.).






## Musical Celebration



### CRU

s my team has served Cru Global and National Leadership teams, we began to notice an evaluation tendency when they are focusing on workforce ministry results or finances. Teams usually start evaluation in 'observation mode' and then into 'action point mode' to steward what God has entrusted to them. (This is my natural approach when evaluating our personal finances, family, personal ministry...).

Instead of starting in an 'observation mode,' our team has challenged them to begin their evaluations with 5 minutes of celebration, expressing gratitude for the things God has been doing. What an amazing change happens within the team environment when we start an evaluation session with five minutes of celebration before moving to concerns and action points! Leadership teams have been giving us feedback that those five minutes of celebration have led to increased gratitude, worship, and encouraging those they serve. Please take five minutes to celebrate with us what God has done through the global campus ministry! Each of these numbers represents a person whose life has been changed

• From 1951-2012 (61 years), Cru started ministries on 4,000 campuses around the world. Yet from 2012-2019 (7 years), God expanded our ministry to an additional 5,444 totaling 9,444

campuses! We saw 19% growth in campuses just last year!

- Last year God brought 169,265 students to faith outside the US through personal Gospel presentations! This is the largest number since 2014. Last year we also saw 657,146 students make decisions to trust Jesus through the Cru evangelistic and discipleship website <a href="https://www.everystudent.com">https://www.everystudent.com</a>. This is the largest number EVER in a year!
- Since 2013, Cru has launched university ministries in 24 new counties. Currently, there are only 8 countries without a Cru presence. We are trusting God to reach those remaining countries by the end of next year.



He was able to get them to the top of the mountain this week, and Martin from La Calamidad worked until midnight last night with a volunteer from Buena Vista to get the clothes and donations divided up for the people of the communities. What a powerful story, a testimonial to our God and the power of prayer.

The church we are helping to build in Buena Vista was not harmed by the storm and the piping (lost in the storm and found) has been delivered so Ribbons of Love and Julio may start working to bring running water to the small community of La Calamidad's chapel and school.
