race is one of those words we hear often in the Christian faith. It means undeserved favor, mercy or kindness towards another, and we think of this when we think of God. We are saved by His grace...not because we deserved God's love and for-

giveness but because He chose us before the foundation of the world to be His own through Christ our Lord (Ephesians 1:4). This is a type of love that the world cannot comprehend.

Beyond saving us, God provides grace for us to face each day through its hardships as well as the good times. However, there are times when we wish we had a little more information about the future or what tomorrow might bring our way. This can lead us to worry or anxiety. Even the Apostle Paul was acquainted with this concern when he dealt with his thorn in the flesh. 2 Corinthians 12:8-9 tells us: "Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. But He said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me." Oh that we could say this when we fall into trials! So what is Paul's secret? He trusted God.

Building trust in God comes from knowing Him intimately and believing that He is good. Prayer is one key to developing that relationship. Obviously, Paul did a lot of praying and crying out to God over his affliction. The result came when the Lord answered him. His illness would not go away, but he found reassurance in the fact that God's power would be made perfect in his

weakness. Paul could go on knowing that the grace of God would be sufficient for him.


In addition to prayer, we can drive out our doubts and worries by knowing the Word of God. Do we read it every day? We should because it reveals to us God's character and all that we need to know to lead a godly life. Jesus said in John 15:15: "I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you." Jesus knew the Father's innermost thoughts. Through the pages of the Bible we are given the revelation of God. It gives us our bearings and the Spirit gives us the power to obey. This is how we develop the trust that drives fear away.

God's grace is not just for today but for the future just like His provision of manna in the wilderness which He provided for the Children of Israel. They never went hungry because the Lord provided their food daily. Their clothes never wore out during the forty years of wandering in the wilderness. In the same manner, God's grace is sufficient for whatever we are called to face, and we know there are hard times as well as times of rejoicing. God will give us the grace just when we need it and not before. Therefore, we need not worry or fret. Instead start each day with a prayer: "Lord, help me and give me your grace today." Then, say thank you and rest in Him! He won't disappoint! Selah!

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Music Ministry



he story is told of several blind men who attempted to describe an elephant to each other. The first grasped the tail, the second a leg, a third the trunk, and the fourth put his hand on the elephant's flank. "An elephant is like a rope!" the first declared. "No!" protested the second, "It is like a tree." The third declared the elephant to be a like a snake, and then the fourth man spoke, "You are all wrong," he declared, "An elephant is like a wall!" Of course, the truth of the matter was that the elephant was far too complex an animal for any one of these comparisons to describe, even if they were all guite accurate. The answers to guestions like, "Why is music so powerful? Why does it play such an important role in human life?" are similarly complex and multi-faceted. This month's newsletter article is planned as the first of a series that will attempt to explore elements of the power of music

in our lives and how they relate to our experience of it both at home and in the church.

It should be acknowledged at the outset that not all people are affected by music in the same way or to the same degree. You may occasionally even hear people say that they hate music altogether (although this seems to be much rarer today than formerly). However, this same observation may be made with regard to taste or touch or the other senses. People may say that they really don't care about food or that they dislike being touched, yet eating and touching are intrinsically bound up in their human experience.

The Bible should always serve as our starting point in any discussion, and it is important to note that Scripture discerns both levels of skill and quality in music (Psalm 33:3, I Chronicles 25:7, II Chronicles 34:12) and the effect of music on human emotions, as in the story of David's playing for Saul in I Samuel 16:14-23. Today, we see something remarkably similar in the work of music therapists, particularly in working with those who struggle with mental anxiety, illness, or dementia. From these examples, it would seem fairly logical to assert that Scripture views musical art as exerting influence and power over people's emotions and thoughts.


Musical song also has a unique ability to be a vehicle for preaching, declaring the word and truth of God as an enhanced and enriched form of speaking. We see this in Scripture in Matthew 21:16, where Jesus applies Psalm 8:2 to the children's songs in His praise, "Have you never read, 'Out of the mouth of infants and nursing babies You have prepared praise'?" The Psalm continues that God uses this praise to silence "the enemy and the avenger."

God has worked in this way throughout history. St. Augustine was brought to conversion by hearing a child "chanting, and oft repeating," the words, Take up and read. Augustine opened the Bible to the book of Romans and found both conviction of sin and salvation in Christ alone.

Another example may be given from the twentieth century. For generations, the bells in Moscow's Red Square had played the hymn Kol slaven nash every day at noon. The bells were refitted after the Revolution to play the Communist anthem, and the government set about vigorously suppressing any vestige of Christianity it could find. The authorities harnessed the power of some of the world's largest media and educational systems to broadcast the message, "There is no God." Yet, throughout the world, Russian exiles continued to sing Kol slaven

nash in defiance: "How glorious is our Lord in Zion,/ Glorious beyond descriptive phrase!/His Heavenly throne is filled with His greatness/And all creation sings His matchless praise!" In Russia today, the bells no longer play the Communist anthem, and Kol slaven is heard again at military funerals and state functions, often being sung or played over the very graves of those who forbade its use. For 73 years, the hymn of the exiles rebuked the atheism of "the enemy and the avenger," ultimately triumphing over it in a manner reminiscent of Psalm 20:7-8, "Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the LORD our God. They collapse and fall, but we rise and stand upright."

Music is powerful—as Martin Luther wrote, "a fair and glorious gift of God." (For the curious, his Tabletalk has a whole chapter devoted to "The Power of Music.") I hope that this short introduction has whetted your appetite for more as we study the intriguing subject of music's power and God's design for it in our lives and the world. "Blessed be the LORD, the God of Israel, who alone does wondrous things. Blessed be His glorious name forever; may the whole earth be filled with His glory! Amen and Amen!" (Psalm 72:18-19).


God bless you for your faithfulness to our ministry. Praise God from whom all blessing flow.

We have received new orders from the president here in Guatemala—last night at 7:30 pm he closed the country until Monday. Then he will readdress the nation to either relax or tighten restrictions. Once again, we are under curfew-which has not lifted since the beginning of March. My staff were not permitted to come to work today. The country's numbers are climbing and some of the hospitals cannot handle the load and the system is in the process of collapse...some hospitals are no longer

receiving new patients. Malnutrition is escalating exponentially—right now it is three times the amount since January. We already knew the numbers were staggering—

We are doing our best to keep our staff and their families fed and taken care of. Encouraged and focused on Jesus. Praise God that we are ALL healthy at this time. Our children are doing well and our staff are receiving much needed rest when we can cover for them. We try to rest when we can. Shane and I will be cooking for the children and nannies this weekend because my staff were unable to come to work.

We are well stocked with materials for the children and food. Medications as well. Praise God for His goodness. Shane, Ava, and I send our love and hugs! We miss you! We pray that you are healthy and doing well. We thank you for your love, support, and prayers. God is faithful. His plan is sovereign. He has created us all for this time, these trials, this life.

We ask for prayers of protection, provision, direction, and discernment. Prayers against fear and lies from the deceiver. Continued health—physical, mental, and spiritual.

We love you. We thank God for you. Much love and many hugs.
